

FISHMEISTERING 101

As usual, TVFF has a lot of great fishing trips lined up for 2012. Lakes and rivers, camping and motelling- the opportunities to learn new areas and fishing techniques are overwhelming!

On the other hand, if you already know the answers about a destination we have listed or you think the club should go to, you should be a fishmeister. As a long-time member who has coordinated a few outings, let me suggest a few tips on how it can be done.

First, generate interest in the trip by writing an article(s) for the newsletter describing in general terms what the site has to offer and why you like it.

Then, from the signup sheet that was circulated at the meetings, develop an email "group" on your PC. Check the club roster to be sure all are TVFF members. **This is important for insurance purposes**. If there is any question, call me and I will check this out. Email the group with names of those expecting to attend. This enables them to contact each other to arrange rides and room arrangements, or if camping, menu planning, etc.

Next, email the prospective attendees significant info regarding the location and its fishing. What facilities are there such as the names of motels and contact information, if you have it, or camping sites. Typical climate conditions, i.e. temperatures as best you know them from having been there, updated weather forecasts and appropriate clothing and gear. Equally important, of course, is fishing information. Are floating devices necessary or recommended? What are the wading conditions and the location(s) of access points. List some of the flies that have been good for you at that location in the past. If you know of a fly shop that can provide even more information provide a name and phone number so that the attendee can ask further questions of them.

That's about all there is to it. Look over the list of our destinations, pick one or more that you are knowledgeable about, and volunteer to lead the trip. If you have a new or different location you would like to go to can offer that too! You will be doing a great service to the Club.


Kistler Ranch Outing - Hal Wilson



Conservation Corner-TIC 2012 Summary

The Trout-In-Classroom (TIC) program sponsored by the Tri-Valley Fly Fishers has, once again, completed a very successful season. With a couple of inexplicable exceptions the program went very well. Approximately 4500 students had the opportunity to witness wild Rainbow Trout eggs hatch, and develop into healthy young fry, in a special aquarium right in their classroom. They participated in classroom curriculum and related activities that taught them about the fish, their lifecycle, and what they need to survive and grow to be healthy adult fish. Their classroom experience culminated in a field trip to a local reservoir where they wished their finny little friends a happy life, released them, and watched them swim away.

Saying "Good-Bye"

One of the teachers, who is new to the program this year, is assisting her students release their fish, on a field trip to Contra Loma Reservoir in Antioch



I continue to be amazed at how attached the kids become to their fish and how they focus on learning all they can about related subjects. They learn so much more when the fish are present in their classroom. Their teachers also acknowledge the exceptional value of the program as an effective teaching tool.

Our program is now blessed with a great "TIC Team" of dedicated club members that deserve to be recognized for their contributions to its success. Both the classroom teachers and I really appreciate their help. **THANKS GUYS!!** This years team members are:

This year we had 34 classrooms, at grade levels ranging from Kindergarten through High School, participate in the program. The schools were located in Antioch, Brentwood, Discovery Bay, Livermore, Dublin, Pleasanton, and Sunol. All total there were 4494 students that received approximately 1280 trout eggs and released slightly more than 1000 trout fry in two different reservoirs. In addition, this year we also started mentoring two different organizations, as sponsors that wish to participate in the management of the program. This should result in the expansion of the program without placing an extraordinary burden on our club. They are: The "Alameda Creek Alliance" (in the Niles Canyon area), and The "Delta Science Center: (in East Contra Costa County). Both groups are excited about being a part of the program.

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TIC 2012 Summary (Continued)

Looking back over what we have accomplished in the last 12 years is a very rewarding exercise. When we started the only source for eggs was through the Nimbus Hatchery in the Sacramento area. However, the fish had to be released back in the river in that area, which became a real issue because it became almost impossible to make field trips up there for our kids. So, we helped establish a "Bay Area" program with trout eggs that allowed us to release the fish locally. This worked much better, and resulted in other bay area clubs joining the program. The program has expanded significantly, and is now recognized as one of the best-managed programs in the state. Our program helped qualify California for a prestigious national award, granted for "Excellence in Aquatic Education" last year.

Our most rewarding accomplishment is that, since we started the program, our club alone has provided this unique learning experience to more than 35,000 students. This should really help in the development of good stewardship for our fisheries in the future.

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

Local Fishing Reports: Ken Tetzel

I'm still getting good dry fly action on the Calaveras River. Small #18 and #20 emergers in the slow water areas are producing during mid-day. 8" to 14" rainbows.

The Lower Stan is fishing okay with nymphs, deep under an indicator. No steelhead for me this year. The Kistler outing was good, like always, with 25-30 bass on a medium frog colored popper. A few larger bass in the 3lb range, was kind of nice!

I hope TVFF continues with this fish-out.



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The Tier's Bench

Flashback Bead Head PT

Hook: Tiempco 2457 size 16-12

Thread: Brown 8/0

Tail: Natural Pheasant Tail Barbules

Rib: Copper Wire

Abdomen: Pheasant Tail Barbules

Wing Case: Flashabou

Thorax: Peacock Herl

Legs: Flashabou

Head: Brass Bead



The Flashback Bead head Pheasant Tail is one of the best flies for the fall season in Northern California. With cooler temperatures the beatis start to fly as well as other mayflies and this is one of the most versatile fly patterns for imitating a large variety of mayflies for both Trout and Steelhead. Since most May Flies are slender I prefer to tie my PT's rather sparse. This is essential for Steelhead as I often tie a small fly on a large hook. This technique is quite easy really. You simply start a little closer to the eye of the hook than you normally would for most flies. The result is a small pattern with a large hook sticking out the back end. I've found that when I am catching Steelhead on a particular pattern and seem to be losing them because it is small, going to a larger fly sometimes turns the fish off the pattern. In this situation tying the same size fly on a bigger hook is usually the answer. The fish don't seem to mind the large hook and it helps keep the hard fighting Steelies on a bit longer.

Step 1-Slide a bead onto the hook and place it in your vise. Tie on your thread and wrap it back to just behind the hook point. Tie in a small clump of pheasant tail barbules (3-6) so that a small amount of the points stick out the back end. The tail should be no longer that the body of the fly.


Step 2-Bend the barbules back toward the back of the fly and secure with several wraps of thread. Tie in a piece of thin copper wire.

Step 3-Wrap the barbules forward ¾ the length of the fly and secure with several wraps of thread. Then *counter wrap* the copper wire to create the rib and add strength. Secure with thread.

Step 4-Tie in a few (4-8) strands of flashabou lying back to the tail of the fly. Then tie a few pieces of peacock herl and secure with thread.

Step 5-Wrap the herl around the hook creating a small ball for a thorax and secure. Pull the flashabou over the top of the ball and secure.

Step 6-To finish the fly, divide the flashabou evenly and pull back along each side of the fly and secure. Tie off by whip finish or half hitch and trim the flashabou to the length of the thorax.

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DFG Seeks New Volunteers in Bay Area, Delta

The California Department of Fish and Game (DFG) is recruiting applicants for its volunteer program in the greater San Francisco Bay Area and Delta counties. The Natural Resource Volunteer Program (NRVP) provides conservation and enforcement education through public service while providing biological, enforcement and administrative staff support to DFG. DFG is holding a NRVP training academy in Fairfield from May 30 through June 12, 2012 (weekdays only). Graduates of this academy become unpaid volunteers for DFG.

The selection process includes an initial screening, application, an interview and a background check. Selected participants attend the 80-hour conservation training course to prepare them for a monthly service commitment of at least 24 hours. After completing the academy, volunteers will work with a trained volunteer mentor during a six-month probationary period. Applicants should be teachable, accountable, have basic computer and writing skills and a willingness to talk about conservation principles to the public in the field and in a classroom setting. Applicants must show a desire to work well with others in a team environment.

Natural Resource Volunteers have no law enforcement authority and are trained to be educational ambassadors for DFG. Volunteer duties could include responding to human/wildlife incident calls, instructing at NRVP academies, representing DFG at community outreach events, disseminating useful information to the public and patrolling DFG lands, ecological reserves, and coastal and inland fishing areas.

Entrance to Rod and Gun Club is directly across intersection







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


DeltaStripers.Com - Jerry Neuberger

DeltaStripers.Com is dedicated to guided catch-and-release fly fishing for stripers and large mouth bass on the waters of the Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta.

A fishing day starts about sunrise and lasts nine to eleven hours with a break for lunch. While catching lots of fish is never guaranteed, a typical fishing day will yield from six to ten stripers per rod or a dozen or more bass per rod. Some days are much more productive and yes, some days are a little tougher! However at the end of every cast there may be that 35 pound striper or a 15 pound largemouth just waiting to rip that rod out of your hands.

Come spend a day on the delta. I can't guarantee you'll catch fish but I'll guarantee you'll have a great day on the water!
