Eagle Lake Fishout Dennis Rankin Date May 26, 27 & 28 (May 26th is the opening day.)

Eagle Lake will open on May 26th, this is a Fishout, no guides just us, the signup sheet will allow us to get phone numbers of each other to stay in touch. Before leaving here I will send a list of all who signed up to each of those who signed up. Communication can be a little tough, Verizon has worked well, AT&T not to good but does work some and hopefully getting better. The weather is unpredictable from cold to 100.

General Information – Eagle Lake is a legendary fishery located in Lassen National Forrest 16 miles from Susanville, CA. It is famous for its Eagle Lake Rainbows, a subspecies adapted to live in the alkaline waters of Eagle Lake. These fish grow quickly and are tough fighters, with their beautiful coloring they are a prize. Note that some of the areas around the lake are soft and sandy; do not drive in these areas without 4 wheel drive.

Fishing-Fishing can be done by wading, tubing or boat. The fishing has been poor the last 2 years and this is attributed to the drastic cuts in fish planted, more than 250,000 less the last 5 years. Some of the productive flies are Rust Wiggle Tails, Leach patterns (olive, blood leach, purple/black and rust Tui Chub imitations, a greenish white snail and sometimes a bright orange pattern. I recommend a 5wt rod with floating, intermediate and or sinking lines. Indicator fishing is popular and is often quite productive. The lake changes and the fishing information are best seen on Val Aubry's web page http://www.eaglelakefishing.net.

Camping - Camping is available at several campgrounds around the lake, the web site is http://www.eaglelakerecreationarea.com/. I will be camping at Merrill Campground; there are full hookups to tent sites at this campground. There are several restrooms in the campground. There are no showers; there is a pay shower at the marina.

Susanville- Susanville is a full service town, hotels, restaurants, sporting goods and fuel. It is about 13 miles and takes about 30 to 40 minutes.

Route – I recommend to get there by going north on I5 to Red bluff and east on HI way 36 to Eagle Lake Rd. HI way 32 through Chico is twisty and a beautiful ride but to crooked for me. On your way you may want to stop at the fly shop in Chester, Tom usually has great recommendations and is a real straight shooter.

Signups – If you are going or are probably going please sign up so we can share the contact information, naturally this is a Fishout, come as you are, no guides just have fun. If you want a guide check the web site of Val Aubry and ask her or the Chester Fly shop.

Upper Sacramento Nymphing Clinic with Jim Roberts Gary Prince

Nymphing Skills Class on the Upper Sac with Jim Roberts

A Special TVFF Opportunity, June 15-17, 2018



Does high stick nymphing confound you?

Have you fully developed your trout "sixth sense" when fishing in pocket water with size 20 Zebra midges? Or perhaps un-locking the hidden secrets of the Upper Sacramento has been a lifelong, yet unfulfilled experience (yea aaa)...

Well, now is your chance to expand your skills with critical nymphing techniques with a great instructor. This trip is focused on education, and has openings for only four more TVFF anglers (1 already signed up).

This two day and two night fly fishing school is designed for the novice angler to learn what it takes to catch fish consistently on a nymph. Each student will learn how to set up their equipment properly, including the knots, lengths of tippet and leaders. Students will learn how to read the water and the strategies to approach the fish, select a fly, and how to present it properly. We will work on effective casting techniques to match the conditions presented on the water. And then once we have learned how to catch the trout, we will learn how to fight the fish to increase the chances of getting it to net.

This is a very hands-on class. Each student should be in fairly good shape as we will be moving around quite a bit. Each student should also have their own equipment, but if not Jim can provide everything. Flies will be provided for the school. Each student must have a valid fishing license.

The trip is \$375.00 which includes two nights lodging (at Jim's place), meals (Jim's home cooking), guided instruction (Jim's expertise) for the 2 days, and loads of laughs watching your fellow anglers slip and fall into the cold Upper Sac. There is a maximum of only five swimmers for this class, with one already signed up. The entertainment alone is well worth the price.

Friday Arrive around 7:00 pm for dinner, seminar on nymphing at the house Saturday Casting instruction, go to the river for seminar on reading the water

Seminar on dry dropper, seminar on nymph and indicator

Lake Almanor Hex-Hatch Fishout Dennis Rankin Date June 23-24

General Information-

The Lake Almanor Hexagina Hatch takes place in June and July of each year. During this time the fishing can be from good to phenomenal. Lake Almanor has rainbow trout (mostly Eagle Lake strain), brown trout and smallmouth bass. The trout range up about 10 pounds most are in the range of 2 to 6 pounds. Lake Almanor is a PG&E owned lake and access to the lake is free and easy to get to. The weather this time of year is great. Bring a head lamp and a flashlight and extra batteries; you may be kicking or coming in in the dark. I will be sending out map sketches later in the cycle suggesting places to access the lake and any last minute information.

Fishing

The hex hatch starts in the early evening and continues until after dark. Nearly all the trout fishing is done from tubes, pontoons or boats. Smallmouths can be fished by wading. Most of the fishing is wet fly with intermediate or sinking lines. My suggestion for a day is to get up and go fish for smallmouths in the morning and then rest and be ready to go out about 4 pm. There are several launch places from the boat ramp at the south, dam end to access places along the west shore. You can drive right to the shore to launch tubes or pontoons, most do. The hatch generally begins at the south end of the lake and progresses up the lake along the west side. The fly patterns seem to change week to week and year to year. These fish are tough and fight extremely well, they don't roll over after a minute or two. For the latest fishing information stop at the Chester Fly Shop (Lake Almanor Fly Fishing Co) just after the bridge on HI way 36 (main street through Chester) Lake Almanor Flyfishing Company - 159 Main Street - Chester, CA - 96020 - 530-258-3944. The correct fly patterns are available there. Hex patterns, wiggle tails and wooly bugger are popular. Smallmouth patterns seem to be marabou chartreuse patterns seem to work well. I recommend getting a map at the fly shop if you do not have one. If you wish to be guided I would suggest that you book a guide early, I personally have never used a guide and do not suggest it.

Camping and Lodging

There are several campgrounds around Lake Almanor, some USFS, PG&E and private. Lake Almanor is a very popular place so make reservations early. Some of the campgrounds are completely booked for the summer. The campgrounds range from those that have just water and restrooms to some with full RV hook-ups and cabins. I will be staying at the North Shore Campground – 530-258-3376

http://www.northshorecampground.com/. This campground has large clean restrooms with showers, hookups, tent sites cabins, a small store, boat ramp and docks. There are others listed on the web pages for Lake Almanor and the town of Chester. There are motels in Chester; I have not stayed in any so I cannot give a recommendation. Again the web is the place to look, but book early.

Restaurants

There are several good places to eat in the area, many I have not eaten at. I will give a few suggestions and ideas; a burger stand on the south side of 36 in Chester has been quite good for hamburgers and

good milkshakes. The Copper Kettle is a good place to have breakfast. The Subway sandwich shop is good and it is convenient to pick up a sandwich on your way to get to the fishing launch area. There are a couple of good pizza restaurants and some full service dinner restaurants. Tantardino's is an excellent Italian restaurant, reservations are required or heavily suggested on weekends, we go for a late lunch and I recommend this one. Tantardino's, 623 Peninsula Drive, Lake Almanor, CA 96137 Phone: 530-596-3902.

Shopping

Chester is a modern town with about everything needed for a good trip; there is a large, modern grocery store, gas stations, etc.

Route

I recommend to go north on I 5 to Red Bluff and then going east on HI way 36. Simple directions, 5 north to 36 east. Beware Chester area and the roads around Chester can be speed traps.

Sign-up

If you are planning to go, please sign up with the requested information so that we can get you the latest information. If you sign up and cannot make it, no harm but if we don't have your information we will not be able to keep you informed. This trip should be great, weather, fishing, friends and the beautiful golden hex fly. If you have any questions or need any information please give me a call or email.

John Baiocchi-Mastering the Dry Fly

For May's meeting we welcome master guide Jon Baiocchi of Baiocchi's Troutfitters. Jon has been fly fishing and tying flies since 1972, and is a California licensed fly fishing guide, published author, educator, innovative tier, and an award winning public speaker giving fly fishing presentations to clubs and expos across the state of California, and Nevada. Jon serves on the Truckee Trout Unlimited Board of Directors, and also volunteers his time with the South Yuba River Citizens League. Born in San Jose, Ca in 1965, his Dad moved the entire family to Paradise, Ca in 1967 to be closer to prime fly fishing venues, and to raise his family in the spectacular forests of Northern California. Jon's Dad, Bob Baiocchi, was inducted into the Federation of Fly Fishers Hall of Fame in 1999 for his peerless conservation work, and was a major influence in helping Jon hone his fly fishing skills at a very young age. After finishing high school, Jon opted out of college to pursue a career as a professional snowboarder, competing at a national level, starring in feature movies, and working with manufacturers in their research and development programs. After his career ended in 1993, Jon focused entirely on fly fishing and conservation, and learning even more of the intricate details of his home waters.

Jon has an all new PowerPoint program that was especially created for numerous fly clubs looking for a more technical program on fishing the dry fly. "Mastering the Dry Fly" entails a brief history of the dry fly and those anglers who were involved from the beginning, simple to complex presentations, understanding rise forms, approaching water structure, tips & tricks, and Jon's favorite patterns for eager to educated trout. Beautiful images and new detailed animated slides provide the audience with clear and concise information for future endeavors on the water while dry fly fishing. This will be a program you do not want to miss!

Fly Tiers Library and Trading Post (LTP)

Most fly tiers, like me, have materials which would probably last several life-times. Often, to tie a new fly, we need a small amount of material which means buying some from the net, which may arrive next week, or jumping in the car for an hour+ drive to a fly shop in the area.



To remedy this, we are creating the LTP. The LTP has 2 resources: the Library for getting small amounts of material (a couple of feathers, small swatch of hair, etc.) and the Trading Post for exchanging your excess with others. Here are the details of how it will work. Both the library and Trading Post are only available to members.

<u>Library:</u> The library will be supported by donations of fly tying material from members. The material will be packaged in gallon sized zip locks with colored labels about the contents. Any member may take a small amount of material for a project and make a modest donation (\$1 min). The donations will be used to buy supplies and, if any is left over, other material for the library.

<u>Trading Post</u>: The trading post allows members to exchange excess tying material_for other material. Any member may submit a gallon sized zip-lock bag with the material along with a very brief description to Jim Broadbent. Jim will assess a point value to the material based on his experience (Jim's decision is final). The material will be labeled with a different colored label than the library. Members may exchange their points for material in the trading post.

Martin Plotkin will arrange for the LTP to show up at all general, board and fly tying meetings. It can also be accessed by special arrangement made with Martin.

LTP kicks-off, at the meeting, on Thursdays so bring your Trades and Donations.


Kistler Bass Ponds April 7, 2018

Conservation Corner:

Mitchie McCammon

On the June 5th ballot is Proposition 68. This proposition would allow California to sell \$4.1 billion in bonds to pay for desperately needed improvements in parks and water systems.

The following is a rough synopsis of the breakdown on how this money will be spent. Each of you will have to decide for yourselves whether you think is beneficial to California or not, but however you choose, please vote. Your voice matters.

Prop 68 would authorize \$2.83 billion for parks projects that would fund everything from building Bay Area hiking trails to upgrading California's 110 state parks. The ballot measure would also provide \$1.27 billion for water projects, including flood protection, levee upgrades in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, water recycling and groundwater pollution cleanups. No money in the bond would fund new dams or Gov. Jerry Brown's proposed Delta tunnels.

Bay Area voters should be aware that the park money allocation is tilted toward urban areas of California that have been designated as "parks-poor." Prop. 68 allocates \$725 million for that purpose. Most of that money will likely go to low-income Southern California and Central Valley communities.

But each Bay Area city will receive a minimum of \$200,000 of Prop. 68 money, and every county in the state is guaranteed at least \$400,000 for parks projects. Prop. 68 also designates \$218 million to repair and improve state parks desperate for money to pay for deferred maintenance. The water projects are critical for protecting California's water supply. The ballot measure allocates \$61 million for Bay Area projects, including \$3 million to restore Los Gatos Creek and the Guadalupe River in San Jose and \$20 million for the Coastal Conservancy to help pay for Bay Area wetlands restoration. Prop. 68 provides \$250 million throughout the state for clean drinking water and drought preparedness and another \$100 million for recycling projects. In endorsing Prop. 68, these leaders and organizations joined a robust coalition who have come out in support of the measure, including the Association of California Water Agencies, The American Lung Association in California, The Nature Conservancy, The Trust for Public Land, League of California Cities, Peninsula Open Space Trust, California Chamber of Commerce, California State Parks Foundation, Save the Redwoods League, SouthernCalifornia Water Coalition, League of Women Voters of California, State Building and Construction Trades Council of California, Sempervirens Fund, TreePeople, The Wildlands Conservancy, Audubon California, Heal the Bay, Clean Water Action and many more.

Prop. 68's widespread support from business, labor, political and environmental groups is impressive. Among the backers are the California Chamber of Commerce, Silicon Valley Leadership Group, Sierra Club, Environmental Defense Fund, Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District, East Bay Regional Parks District, and the State Building & Construction Council of California.
